Looking to 2024

Growth and expansion of projects and activities to **Bring History to Life!** at the ECCHS Museum made great strides in 2023.

During 2023 the Board of Directors focused resources on:

- Increasing membership and active participation of members
- Increasing number of visitors to the museum
- Increasing ECCHS participation in community events
- Improving inventory process and display of our collections
- Upgrading museum buildings and grounds to expand exhibits and make available for community use

Over 6,000 volunteer hours dedicated to our museum this past year resulted in many gains toward these goals:

- Membership gained 45 new members and 8 new business members
- A Members Night at the Museum with special displays was instituted
- Museum Open Hours welcomed a record 443 visitors in 2023
- Pole Barn was cemented to create an inviting space to host events
- ECCHS participated in 10 community events (up from 7 in 2022)
- 1,623 third graders plus 400⁺ parents participated in Local History Days
- The Resource Center welcomed local residents and organizations researching community and family histories.

Forget the snow part and you have in a nutshell what our dedicated crew happily endure in tirelessly restoring, creating, and maintaining projects on the museum grounds a minimum of 104 times a year.

During the winter months it can be bitterly cold and damp, and the pole barn is a wind tunnel that does serve to keep the rain off while we freeze! In the summer months the burning sunshine can only be escaped under its' roof, but many of their jobs must be carried out in the open.

There is not a better gang of workers than **Bob Byer**, **Dennis Nunn**, **Tony Campagna**, **Joe Niec**, **Tim Karlberg**, **Tim Kelly**, **Tom Snyder**, **Paul Krey**, and emeritus but frequent visitor **Loren Robinson**.



A special shout-out goes to **Joe Senn** who, in spite of being home recuperating from major surgery, continues to be our on-line research guru who scouts out arcane bits and pieces which often can't easily located.

If you should wander out under the pole barn and adjacent open area near the schoolhouse you will find the **Heidorn water wagon** dismantled into several hundred pieces and, other than the water tank and a body frame without wheels, it is basically unrecognizable.

Hundreds of hours have already been spent in reducing this very large wagon into piles of wood and rusted metal which will ultimately be reassembled and become a 100+ year-old water wagon with many original parts.

A Local Treasure Finds its Way Home to ECC

Brentwood, Calif. July 27th 1902

In a small box found in a house in San Francisco by a person who recently moved to Brentwood, tucked among momentos and postcards was a small treasure to our local community.

A letter written by Brentwood resident Paul DeMartini to a friend in San Francisco gives insight into life in 1902.

twood leale My dear Friend Fred-

I was glad to receive your kind and welcome letter last week. You told me that you are coming here on Saturday, and I quickly send a letter to you, for you can come here on Monday, before you got a job in San Francisco. I went to the town of Brentwood for waiting for you coming here in three times, but you don't come here so that we felt disappointed.

But you said to me that you got a job & will come here before you are going to the school. We hope that you are surely to come here. You will eat grapes enough if you are coming here. I think you better work in the Rope Factory so you must make money for yourself. I am great, great surprised that your sister got a baby and you are a uncle.

We finished shipping corn for market and then make almost \$750.00 in 4 weeks. Now my horses are eating corn in the cornfields. The fourth of July we did not go to Black Diamond for a celebrated Day, because 6 men were working on the header in my ranch. Now they finished doing so. We got mad. Everyday the wind continues to blow from the West. We don't feel warm except feel warm during our dinner.

Last Sunday the Byrons defeated the Tracys at baseball by a score of 22 to 4 runs. I was a pitcher & helped the Byrons doing against the Tracys. Next Sunday the Byrons will go to Tracy to play baseball against them. Today we are going to Concord for having our big party. There are a couple of people in the big party. We hope that we will have the lots of good times.

I must close My best regards to all your family.

I am Yours Truly Paul Demartini

P.S. My family give your sister's baby regards. We think that your nephew is fine. We like to see your nephew.

P.S. If you are coming here before the school will be opened, Do you like to pick the grapes in the boxes? But I try to question you. Answer



Local History Days are Coming!

The Museum will once again come alive with the sound of 3rd grade students from local schools starting in April.

East Contra Costa Historical Society works hand-in-hand with Brentwood, Byron, Knightsen, and Oakley School Districts to enhance study of local history for all third grade students. Children tour the museum to learn about the rich history of their local community in the morning, followed by lunch under the Pole Barn.

In the afternoon, that history is brought to life through hands-on activities when students step back into the late 1800's to experience a day in school, play games and do chores of the time period.

1,600 students plus 400 parents participate in the Local History Days at the ECCHS Museum annually. Many report that it is the best field trip ever!

ECCHS and City of Brentwood Work Together to Honor Migrant History



As development starts on the site of what was once **Davis Auto Camp**, East Contra Costa Historical Society has been working with City of Brentwood to design an area to honor the great influx of farm workers to our area from the Midwest during the Depression and Dust Bowl and from Mexico as part of the Bracero Program. These workers came for work and contributed to the agricultural heritage of our area.

What began as personal research into her family story by ECCHS Oral Historian **Sharon Ellingson** soon extended into deeper research on the history of camps as well as clusters of houses to meet housing needs for the influx of population.

ECCHS shared the important role camps and housing clusters such as Davis Camp holds to our local history with the Brentwood City Council and was pleased with their enthusiastic positive response to a proposal to dedicate a small area to honor this important part of our past. We have been meeting and will continue to provide content for interpretive panels to be placed near the trails on the Davis Camp property.
