
Resource Center Treasures

This past year ECCHS has had the honor of working with the City of Brentwood to memorialize the site where Davis Camp once stood at the corner of Brentwood Boulevard and Sunset Road. Three historical interpretive panels have been researched and created:

- Picking, Packing and Shipping: Getting the Crops to Market
- Davis Auto Camp and the Log Cabin Grocery Store
- Help Save the Crops: Introducing the Bracero Program

In recognition of national Hispanic Heritage month, we would like to share with you the panel about the importance role the Bracero Program has played in our local history.





Narrative of the panel:

When America entered WWII, disaster threatened the local farmers due to a labor shortage caused by farm workers joining the military and starting work in the war industry. Crops would have to go unpicked, resulting in a loss of profits for the farmers. Needing at least 1,500 workers, an immediate call was put out to the surrounding areas pleading for help.

Realizing the urgent need for agricultural workers, in August of 1942, the Federal Government implemented the Mexican Farm labor Program, commonly known as the Bracero Program. This was the temporary importation of workers from Mexico to aid the American agricultural economy. Through the years more than 4 million Mexican nationals left their families behind and came to work in the fields. These people were essential to harvesting the crops of the United States.

The Mexican Farm Labor Program, just as the workers who came during the Depression, had a lasting effect on Brentwood's population. Many of the descendants of these families started local businesses, took jobs in other industries, bought farms, became community leaders and still live in the area.



The three panels are in production and will be installed on the site next to Marsh Creek. Watch for an announcement by the City of Brentwood regarding dedication of these interpretive panels.

ECCHS will also notify all members of this important date when it has been set.

It's an almond knocker!





Local farmer John Papini uses an almond knocker to harvest almonds.

Circa 1960's

Tree knockers were used to strike the branches of almond trees, which would cause the almonds to fall onto tarps laid beneath the trees.

The tree knocker was phased out during the mechanization boom in the 1950's. Today trees are shaken by a mechanical shaker and almonds are swept

up by machine.

James O'Hara settled in the Oakley region in 1887. He cleared and

cultivated land and planted 80 acres of almonds, later adding 160 acres of nut and fruit trees. He organized the Almond Growers Association of East Contra Costa County in 1889.

Breakers Update


Our team of Breakers are busily preparing the museum for winter weather and continually looking for better ways to make our grounds usable, as well as continuing to give new life to treasures from the past.

In preparation for winter rains the window and door frames of the resource center are being repainted.

As more and more events are being held at the museum, a newly assembled large rolling chair rack will greatly simplify moving chairs for set up and take down.











Restoration is about to begin on the pilot house from the Victory I ferry that used to ferry people and their cars between the roads of Antioch and Sherman Island before the first Antioch Bridge was built in 1926.

This treasure from the past was donated to ECCHS by Chris Lauritzen, III and his sister Margaret when Lauritzen Yacht Harbor was sold last year.

A recently donated 20' x 35' pole barn will soon be erected to house the restoration process out of the weather.

A small but interesting collection of old cameras has made their way to the museum through the years. We are looking to expand this collection to create an interesting display of the development of the camera from early daguerreotype cameras to the 'picture box' using film to the digital photos taken by phones today.

In looking at our collection, we remembered the flash bulbs that burned your hand when you removed them to replace a new one. The little cube flash with four sides that flipped for the next photo. Or the early moving picture cameras without sound. All good memories.

We do not know what image capturing devices will look like in the future but we would like to preserve the past for future generations to see and understand.

If you have a camera from years past that you were thinking of tossing, or have in a closet and just don't know what to do with it, consider a donation to the Museum. We are interested in accepting donations of cameras from the 1800s to about 2000.

Hundreds of photos in ECCHS collection provide the basis for displays and historical accounts such as those in the museum and the Davis Camp & Bracero Program interpretive panels developed for community display. Today, most people take their photo memories on a phone and store them in a cloud somewhere. But printed photos and videos are invaluable to preservation of the past. Memories fade, but photos capture a 8 moment in time that can call those memories to mind.
